Two Components to Public Notices

1. Informing the public of the notice, and
2. Providing access to the information pertaining to that notice

Advertising is one of many ways the government ensures that individuals, families and businesses have the information they need to exercise their rights and responsibilities and to make decisions about their health, safety and security.

- Making information accessible online does not mean the public has been informed. It is critical to keep Public Notices in the public record with newspapers.
- Publishing Public Notices in newspapers is vital to the democratic process of a community.
- In most cases, the newspaper is also the only printed record of history for a community. Once printed it cannot be altered, erased or hidden.

**“Public Access”
does not mean
“Public Notice”**

- The purpose of Public Notice is to display information in places where the public is likely to come into notice.
- Traditionally and effectively, newspapers have published public notices because newspapers spark curiosity and are delivered to the interested public.
- Access to Public Notice provides the public an opportunity to influence governing bodies and be an active participant in a democratic society.

notifying the public that
information exists.**

Online Public Notices can only be effective if the public knows where to look and is willing to take time out of their day to go searching for them.

If Public Notices were available **ONLY online, residents would be responsible for searching the web to find out information that could affect their communities.**

How will residents know when and where to look for things like:

- Street closures
- Land use/zoning bylaw changes
- Buying/selling of public land
- Proclamations
- Council remuneration
- Preparation of assessment rolls
- Elections/By Elections/Abandonment of poll
- Public hearings
- Bids/Tenders/Request for proposals
- Employment opportunities
- Annexation intentions
- Changes to fees and charges
- Approval of the municipal budget
- Notice to expropriate land for public use

What is Zoning Amendment (Train Station Park) Bylaw No. 696, 2012 about?

To designate the train station lands on Frontier Street, outlined with a heavy black line, as PR-1 Parks and Recreation*. The amendment also permits the subject lands to have no minimum building setbacks or maximum lot coverage requirements.



How Will This Affect Me?

The train station building and lands were recently acquired by the Village of Pemberton. The purpose of the bylaw is to establish the zoning as a park for public purposes.

FIRE & PROTECTIVE SERVICES NEWS:

- > **FIRE BANS IN EFFECT – A PARTIAL FIRE BAN is currently in EFFECT.** This means you can still burn recreational fires, burning barrels and incinerators but **ALL OTHER FIRES are banned.** Because there is a FIRE BAN – all Fire Permits are now invalid and no more will be issued until the ban is over. If you are doing any burning, you do require a Fire Permit year round – contact our office before beginning your burn to get your permit.

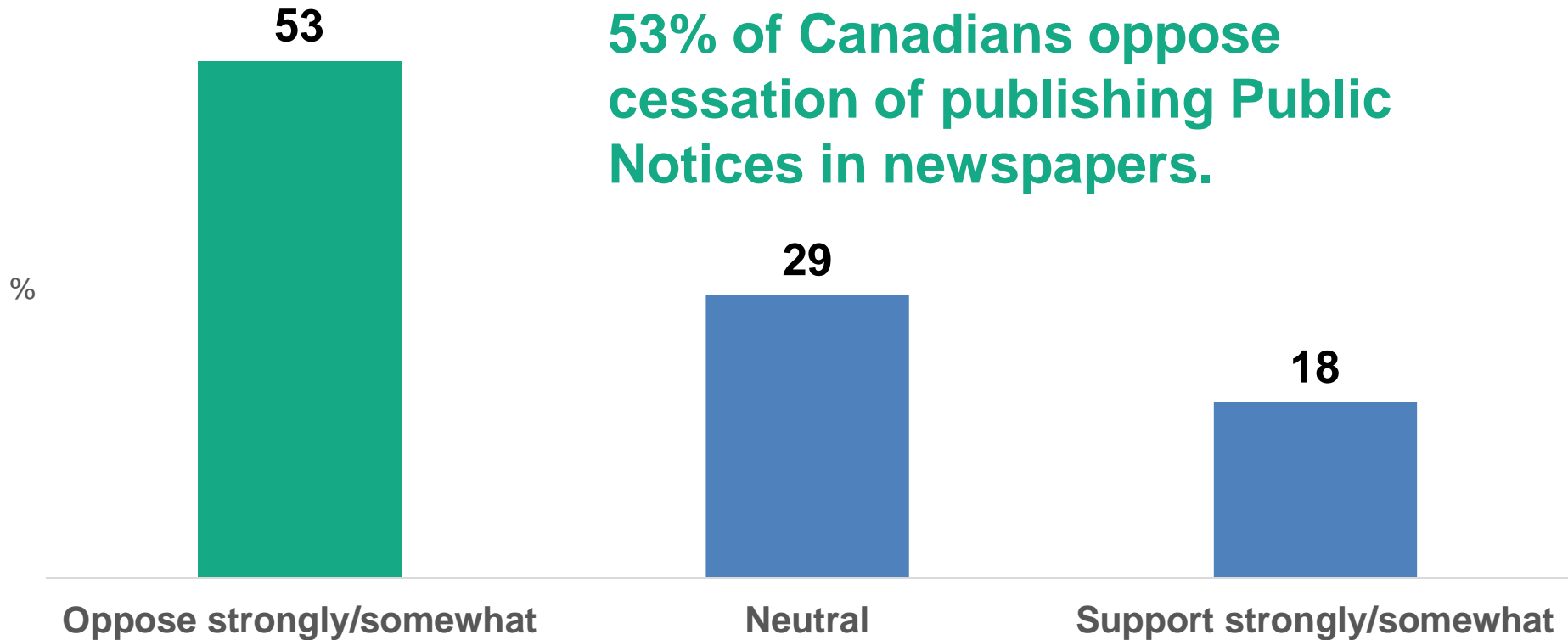

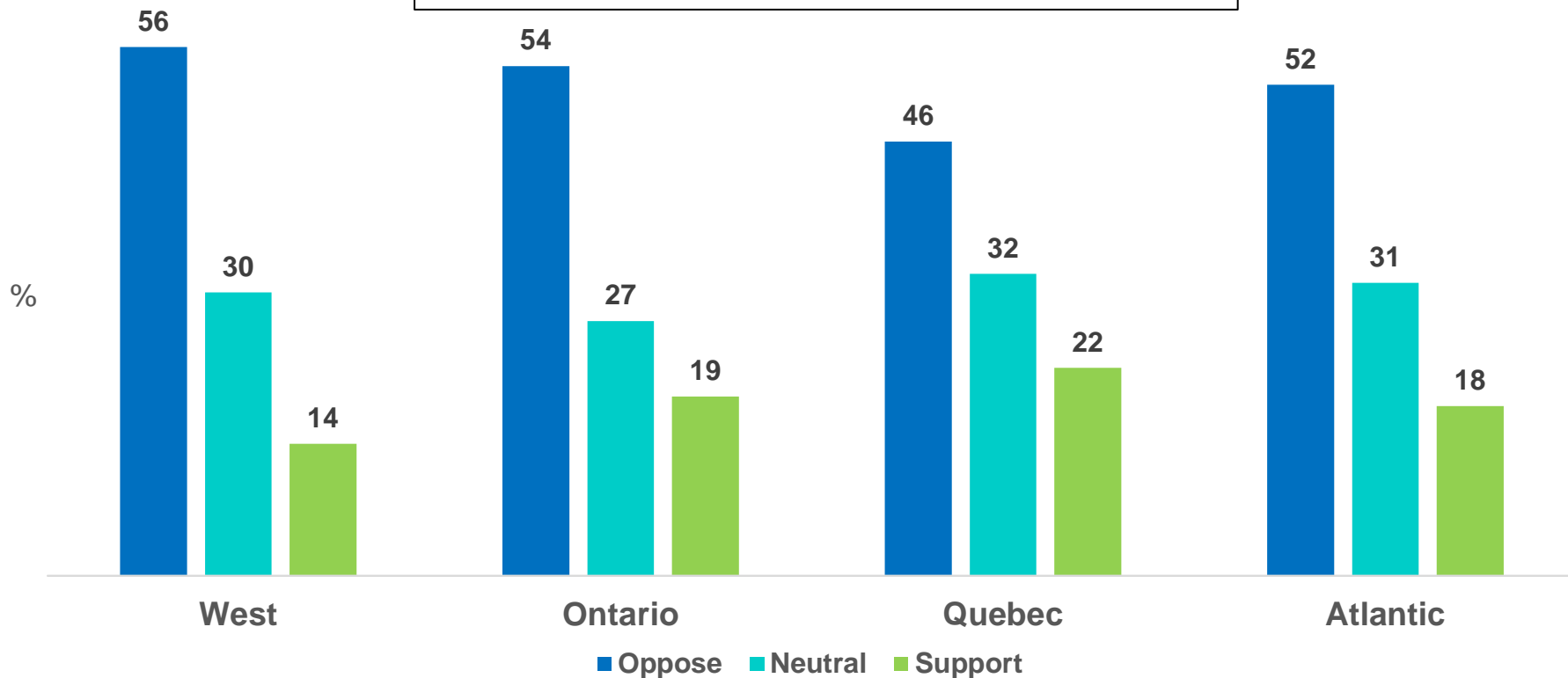
More than Half of Canadians Want Public Notices in Newspapers

Consumers are Opposed to Dropping Public Notice in All Regions

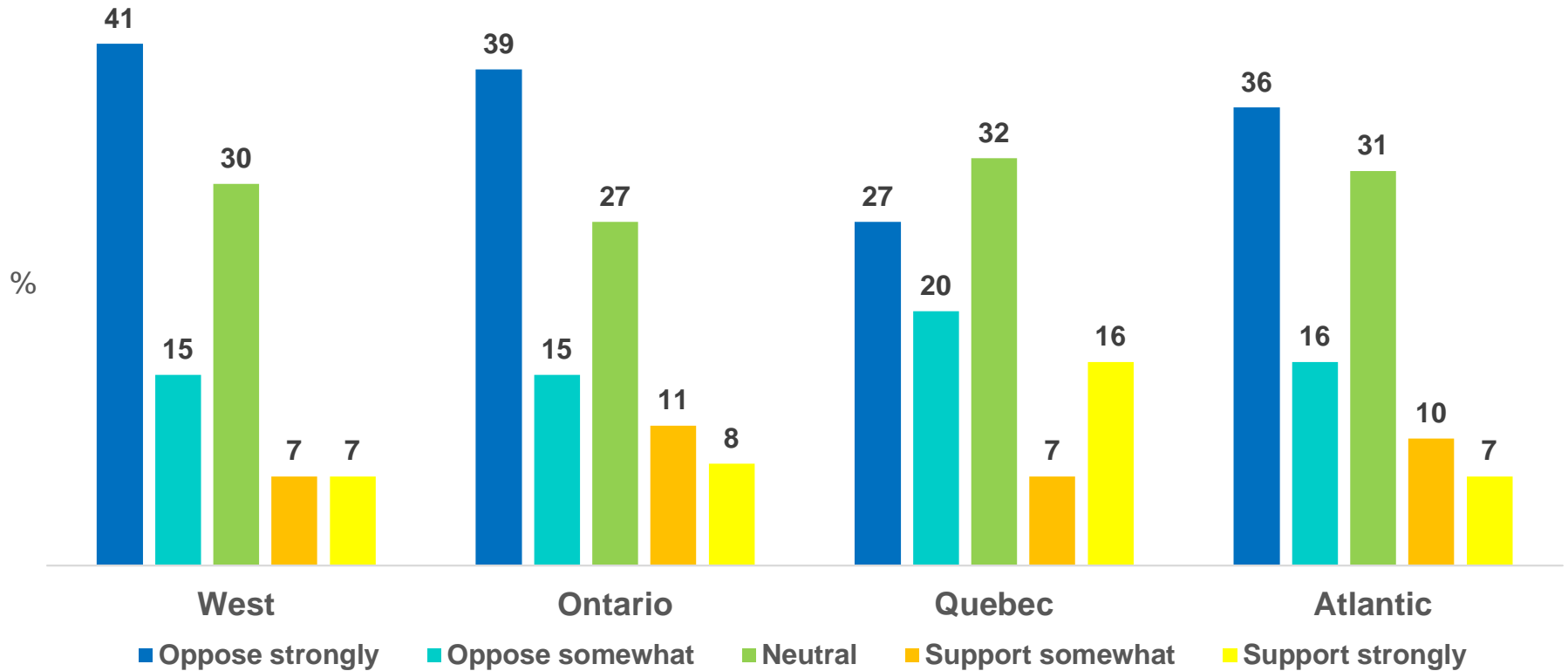
Opposition is strongest in English Canada.



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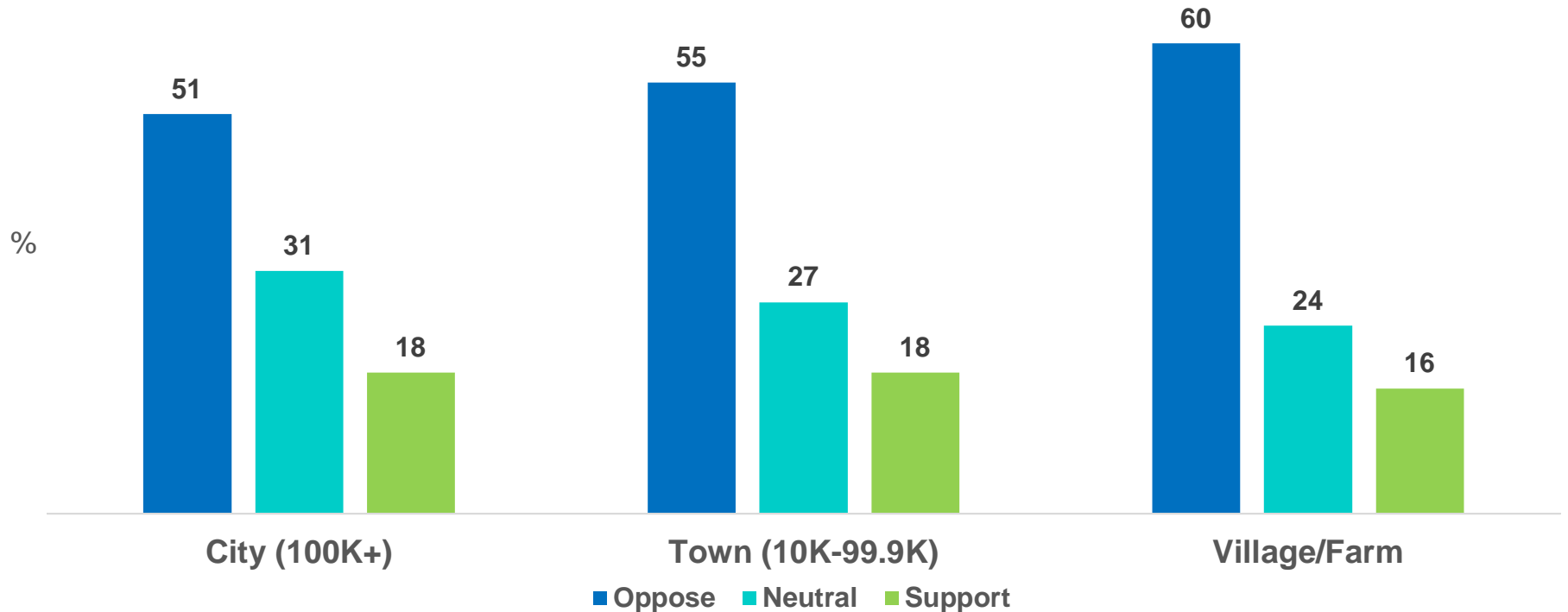
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Consumers are Opposed to Dropping Public Notice in All Communities

Study Design

- Online study with 800 adult Canadians.
- Invitation blasts sent out between February 13-20, 2019.
- West, Ontario and Atlantic quotas of 167 responses; Québec quota of 300 responses.
- Target 60 completions in communities of <100K in West, Ontario and Atlantic and 100 in Québec.
- Age, language and gender targets applied to ensure reasonable representation.
 - Respondents were 50% male, 50% female.
 - At least half of respondents were Millennials; 40% aged 35-64; and 10% aged 65+.
 - 75% English language and 25% French language.
